tailed deer inhabit all states except for: Utah, Nevada, and most of California.

Is it an illusion that we are overwhelmed by the presence of deer and the black bear, because the human population continues to increase and expand? Deer populate at a very fast pace, almost like that of rabbits and mice. But, the amount of space they are able to live and feed in decreases each year as we humans continue to build and expand the amount of space we need to

live in. Inevitably the deer, and other wildlife, are crowded out of their original territory and that sets up increasingly close encounters with people. There are several reasons, or defenses, for hunting wildlife. "An injured bobcat attacked a golfer on a fairway at Skyline Country Club Tuesday morning, seriously injuring him."

"A male deer attacked a man, 73, in Rancho Santa Fe in Southern California as he was picking tomatoes in his garden on Sept. 25."

And would you believe: "Madison WI - April 19, 2006: City police confirmed a vicious wild turkey broke into a house." And of course we all know of the recent news report of the Ohio family devastated by a black bear attack that killed their six year old daughter in Benton, Tennessee on April 13, 2006.

Why have these attacks been happening more frequently? The most reported theory, as I mentioned above, is that humans are basically taking over the areas in the mountains, woodlands and marshlands that the wildlife have called home for centuries. Other theories suggest a reduced food supply in the woodlands due to less space in combination with irregular weather patterns?
